SUBJECT: Inspection

TO: W. P. Hannon, Camp Inspected July 26th 1935.

- 1. Camp is located one and three tenths miles south of the village of Star Lake, Wisconsin, in Vilas County. Camp railhead is Star Lake, Wisconsin. Telegraph Office is Star Lake, Wisconsin, open 8:00 A.M. to 5:00 P.M. Post Office at Star Lake, Wisconsin. Telephone Exchange: Rhinelander, Wisconsin. Forestry Exchange at Trout Lake Ranger Station, Wisconsin. Long distance is obtained by calling Rhinelander, Wisconsin.
 - Date camp was originally occupied: November, 1933.
 - 3. Permanent constructed camp.
 - 4. Water from camp well furnished from deep well pump.
 - 5. Electricity furnished by power plant at Minocqua, Wisconsin.
 - 6. Wood supplied by Technical Service.
- 7. Mess: Non-perishable supplies furnished by the District Quartermaster at Sparta CCC District, Sparta, Wisconsin. Perishable supplies purchased locally.
 - 8. Laundry and Shoe Repair:
- (a) Formal contract entered into with the Eagle Steam Laundry, of Eagle River, Wisconsin, for the periods April, May, and June. Formal contract for period July, August, and September, not yet completed, entered into with Eagle Steam Laundry, Eagle River, Wisconsin.

- (b) Enrollees attend moving pictures or dances in Eagle River, once weekly. Eagle River is about 27 miles distant from camp.
